<u>PURPOSE</u>: To measure indicators related to current alumni employment, satisfaction with experiences at IUPUI, effectiveness of IUPUI on learning, further education, and connection to IUPUI.

<u>METHODS</u>: Survey administered to graduate student alumni who graduated from Fall 2011 to Spring 2014 for which the Office of Alumni Relations had up-to-date contact information. All graduates from Summer 2014 were included in the sample.



- Over half (55%) of Robert H. McKinney School of Law alumni respondents are men, just under two-thirds (65%) are white, and 15% are international.
- There is an underrepresentation of international students and an overrepresentation of white law alumni survey respondents compared to all School of Law alumni who were invited to participate.
- Only 8% of Law alumni respondents also attended IUPUI for their undergraduate degree.


### Section 1: Employment

# Figure 1 Employment Status



- The large majority (87%) of all IU McKinney law alumni are working either full-time or part-time.
- Even though a larger amount of Science graduate students report not working for pay and not looking for work, almost all of these alumni are currently enrolled in another program leading to a degree.
- Over three-quarters (79%) of those currently working are employed in Indiana which is slightly more than other units on campus (72%).


# Figure 2 Type of Employer



- Over half of recent IU McKinney alumni are currently working for a law firm (35%) or government (25%).
- Over 8 in 10 respondents (83%) who are currently working report that their position is related to their law degree. However, McKinney law alumni have a larger percentage that say their job is not related to their graduate program (17%) compared to alumni from graduate programs in other schools on campus (7%).
- Of those alumni whose job is directly related to their graduate program, 37% believe their IU
  McKinney education prepared them for their job very well. This is lower than other alumni
  where just under two thirds (65%) of alumni whose job directly relates to their degree believe
  their education prepared them very well.
- IU McKinney alumni (36%) are less likely than alumni from other units (55%) to state that their education enhanced their prospects for future advancement very well.
- Slightly less than two thirds of working respondents (63%) agree with the statement, "The job I have is the job I want."
- Of the IU McKinney alumni who have been employed since graduation, 75% are still in their first job. For those who have left, the majority (65%) leave their first job within 13 months.
- Roughly 40% of McKinney alumni have an annual salary of at least \$60,000 which is more than
  other units where this is true for 34% of alumni. The largest percentage of alumni in one salary
  range is \$40,000 to \$59,999 where just over one-third (34%) of IU McKinney alumni report to be
  their personal annual salary.

#### Section 2: Student Loan Debt

- Slightly over half of IU McKinney alumni (51%) report having no debt related to their undergraduate degree while this is true for only 17% of alumni regarding their graduate degree.
- Just under half of IU McKinney alumni (47%) have \$100,000 or more debt related to their degree from McKinney which is much more compared to graduate students in other units (11%) on campus.
- Over one third (36%) of McKinney alumni state that they are not at all confident that they will be able to pay off their student loans on time which is significantly more than students from other units (18%).
- Half of the McKinney respondents are at least somewhat confident they will be able to pay off their student loans on time.

#### Section 3: IUPUI Experience

- The vast majority (86%) of IU McKinney alumni respondents are satisfied or very satisfied with the overall quality of their academic experiences.
- The lowest satisfaction items seem to be centered on the theme of involvement by the School with student's education.
- IU McKinney alumni are significantly less likely to be satisfied or very satisfied with the quality of advising or mentorship (44%) when compared to other units at IUPUI (70%).
- Although the majority are satisfied (57%) IU McKinney are significantly less likely than other units (72%) to be satisfied with their opportunities for career development.



- Overall, respondents are satisfied with the co-curricular experience at IUPUI.
- IU McKinney alumni report that they would like to have more opportunities for career development with 43% being dissatisfied or very dissatisfied.

The majority of alumni respondents (74%) would either probably or definitely attend IU
 McKinney if they had an opportunity to start over again – lower than alumni from other IUPUI graduate programs (88%).

- Respondents were asked if they completed an assistantship or internship/externship while at IUPUI. Two thirds (67%) of all IU McKinney respondents had an internship/externship while in school while only 8% of alumni completed an assistantship.
- Among those who did not have an assistantship, most did not desire one (74%), but there were
  a noticeable amount that wanted an assistantship but report that their department did not offer
  them (24%).
- The majority of respondents are satisfied with how assistantships (90%) and internships/externships (79%) are assigned.
- Overall IU McKinney alumni are satisfied with their assistantships and internships/externships. A
  larger percentage of respondents who completed an internship/externship report being
  satisfied with how it prepared them for the job market but this trend is evident among other
  units at IUPUI.
- Of those students who completed an internship/externship, more than one out of five (22%) had it turn into full-time employment and 10% were offered a position but turned it down.



- Alumni respondents rate themselves as mostly effective on skills and abilities that are related to the principles of graduate and professional student learning (PGPLs).
- Respondents rate themselves highest on the skills/abilities of behaving in an ethical way (97%)
  and thinking critically (92%) where the vast majority believe they are either effective or very
  effective.
- School of Science graduate student alumni rate themselves lowest regarding marketing themselves effectively and conducting original research which are also the lowest rated items for many of the units on campus.
- When conducting a t-test to compare IU McKinney alumni to other respondents, McKinney respondents rate themselves as significantly lower regarding marketing themselves effectively (p <.001). McKinney alumni are not significantly different from other IUPUI graduate students regarding conducting original research and scholarship.


#### Section 5: Further Education



- The large majority of IU McKinney alumni (83%) are not presently enrolled in a program and have no plans for further study which is significantly more than other units (58%) which is expected.
- Five of the six alumni currently enrolled in a program were accepted into their first or second choice.


#### Section 6: Connection with School

- The vast majority (87%) of IU McKinney alumni respondents obtain information regarding the School.
- The most common method of obtaining information about IU McKinney include is through email (71%). It is important to note that this survey was collected through e-mail invitations so that may skew this item.
- IU McKinney alumni report obtaining information through printed publications (26%) at slightly higher rates than other alumni respondents (18%).
- Less than one out of five respondents (15%) report feeling a very strong connection toward the IU McKinney School of Law.
- The majority of alumni report feeling either some (42%) or very little (30%) of a connection to McKinney which is not different from alumni of other units at IUPUI.

### Section 7: IU McKinney School of Law Supplemental Questions



- Two thirds of IU McKinney alumni respondents report that CLE programs would be beneficial, while just under half (46%) believe career counseling to be useful to alumni.
- Slightly over two thirds of alumni (68%) report that they are interested or very interested generally in the IU McKinney School of Law
- IU McKinney alumni respondents are more likely to provide volunteer support rather than
  monetary support with rates of 60% and 35% reporting they would be likely or very likely to do
  so, respectively.
